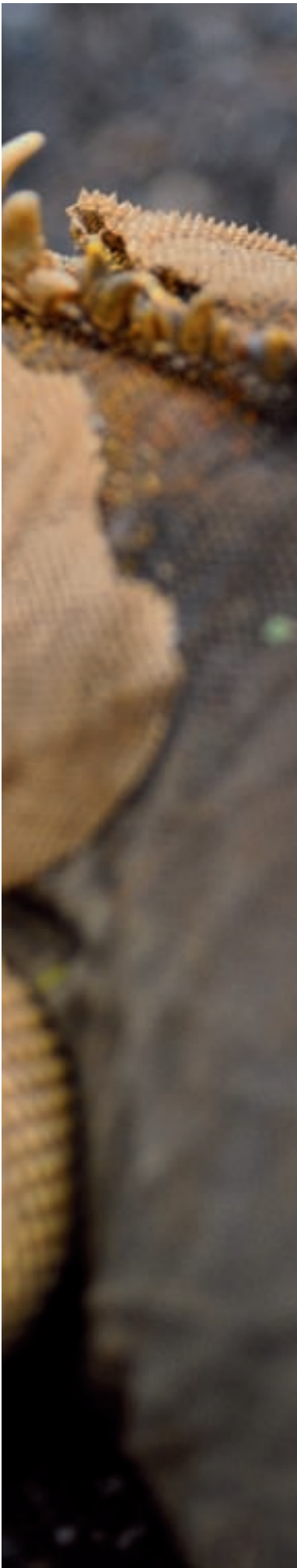




# Galápagos Islands



Remote, spectacular and utterly unique, the Galápagos Islands are a 'once in a lifetime' destination for anyone interested in the natural world. The wonderfully diverse wildlife and dramatic volcanic landscapes exceed expectations, exciting even the most well-travelled visitors.

## At a glance

- 19 volcanic islands of varying sizes, located along the equator, 600 miles from the coast of Ecuador
- UNESCO World Heritage Site
- Unique, fearless and sometimes bizarre wildlife including giant tortoises, blue and red-footed boobys, marine iguanas, colonies of sea lions and frigate birds
- Boat cruises of 3, 4 or 7 nights available. Also hotels on some islands
- Advisable to book at least 9-12 months ahead
- The Galápagos Islands tend to be hot with intermittent rain between December and May, cooler and more overcast June to November
- Walking tours available – please see page 118

## → Getting there

Flights from Quito and Guayaquil operate to Baltra and San Cristobal in the Galápagos. All flights to the Galápagos start in Quito and touchdown in Guayaquil en route (return in the same direction).

Please note, there is a 1 hour time difference between Ecuador mainland and Galápagos.

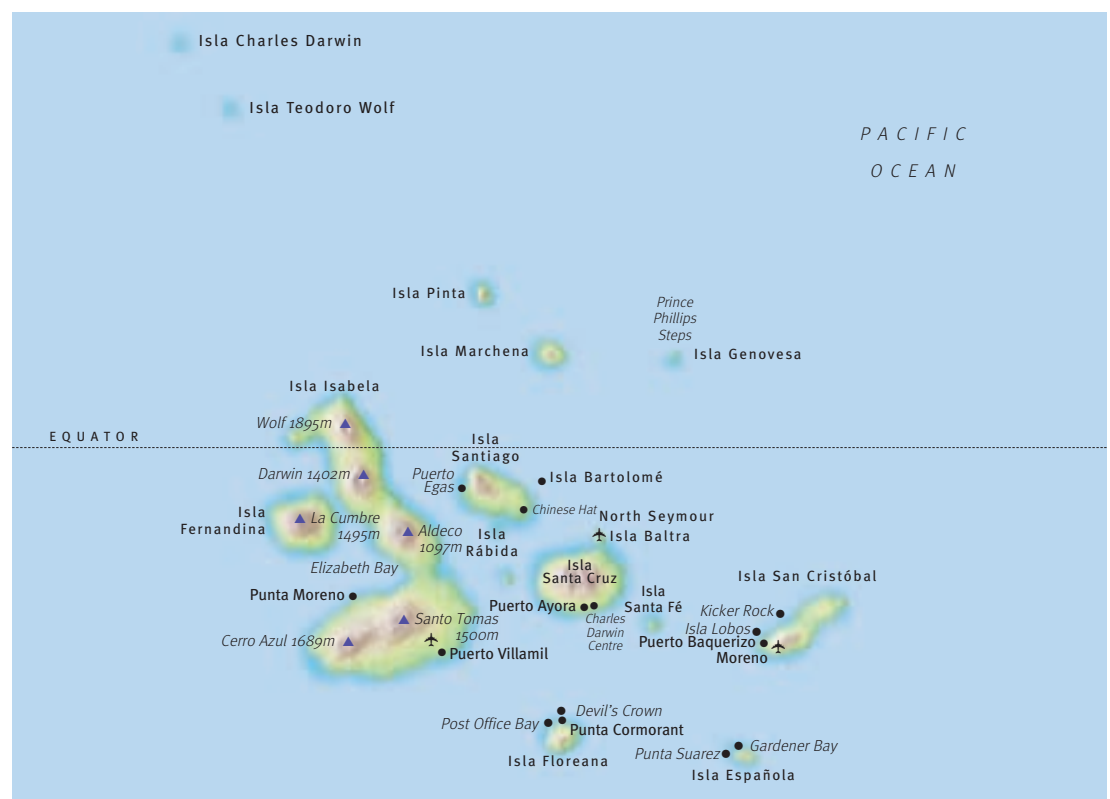

## Combinations

It is recommended to stay at least 2 nights in **Quito** or **Guayaquil, Ecuador** prior to flying to Galápagos, particularly when taking a cruise.

Ecuador has so much variety to offer; the cloud forests, the **Amazon**, the **Andes** and colonial cities: Mainland Ecuador and Galápagos is an interesting combination.

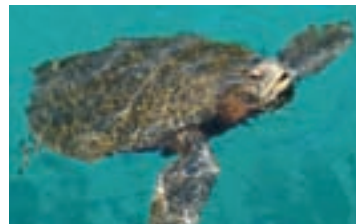
Galápagos also combines well with **Peru**; please see pages 22-29 for the suggested 'Incas & Islands' itinerary and further country combinations.





## The Galápagos Islands

In order to conserve and protect the wildlife and environment of the Galápagos Islands, the number of visitors is controlled by the Galápagos National Park Authority. A selection of some of the islands and what you might expect to see are shown below.



### Santa Cruz

The most populated island, starting point for most cruises, and a selection of hotels for those who prefer to stay on land or combine with a cruise or walking tour. Charles Darwin Research Station is located in Puerto Ayora; here vital work is undertaken to boost and preserve the wildlife of Galápagos. Visitors can enjoy the extensive range of exhibits and, known to be the sole survivor of his species, "Lonesome George" may also be seen here.

### San Cristobal

The main town, Puerto Baquerizo Moreno, is the capital of Galápagos and has excellent natural history displays at the local Interpretation Centre. Here is the second main airport and starting point for some cruises. Isla Lobos is a nearby islet and home to many sea lions, blue footed boobies and frigate birds. Cruise around the cliffs of nearby Kicker Rock for a good view of large colonies of sea birds including the red-billed tropic birds.

### Isabela

The largest island and comprised of 6 volcanoes which have fused together over time. White sand beaches, rocky inlets and mangroves line the coast while most of the interior is impassable. Tagus Cove, location of Darwin's crater lake and good habitat for Darwin's finches. Around cliffs, pelicans, penguins and sea lions may be seen. Elizabeth Bay is ideal for marine wildlife such as turtles, reef sharks, sea lions, rays and Galápagos penguins.

### Floreana

On the Northernmost tip of Floreana lies Punto Cormorant, not known for the cormorant, however, it is the best place to see flamingos. A nearby beach, an important nesting site for turtles and the shallow waters, a favourite with stingrays. Devil's Crown, known for snorkelling and scuba diving; you may see reef fish, white-tipped sharks, even hammerheads. West lies Post Office Bay famous for a makeshift mail drop operating since 18th Century.



### Española

The Southernmost island and home to large colonies of blue footed and masked boobies and in season (usually April-December); the waved albatross at Punta Suarez. Sea lion colonies can be seen at Gardner Bay. Marine iguana, hooded mockingbirds, finches, tropic birds, swallow tail gulls and the Galápagos hawk may also be seen.

### Santa Fé

A tiny island, 25km from Santa Cruz, there is a bay protected by a peninsula, ideal for snorkelling. A good location for tropical fish, it may be possible to view spotted eagle rays, stingrays and the white tipped reef sharks. The island has a forest of giant cacti, some reaching 10m in height and unique to this island.

### Santiago

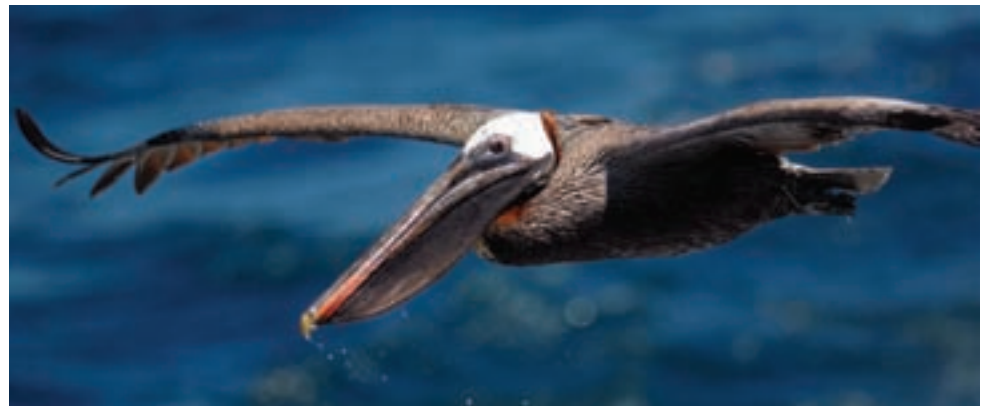
Once the site of a salt mining enterprise, this island is now uninhabited. At Puerto Egas, marine iguanas, sea lions and wading birds can be seen and within rock pools created by lava, Sally Lightfoot crabs, urchins and octopuses. Grottos of fur seals are also nearby. Historically, Buccaneer Bay was a hide out for pirates.

### Bartholomé

A small island, East of Santiago, is home to one of Galápagos' landmarks, the 'Pinnacle Rock'. This jagged remnant of an old tuff cone and nearby lava fields make for a wonderful view from a look out point at the island summit (114m). From the beach beneath the rock, Galápagos penguins are often seen when snorkelling.



The Galápagos Islands can be visited year round. There are 2 main seasons: the hot / wet season from December to May with warm air and sea temperatures and occasional heavy rainfall; and the misty (garua) season from June to November with cooler air and sea temperatures and more wind. The seasonal variations affect the wildlife cycles in different ways. With the land based animals tending to breed in the warm season, and those that get their food from the sea tending to breed in the garua season, there is always something interesting to see. Please note, timings may vary from year to year and island to island.

**A few wildlife facts**

There are five families of reptiles on the islands: iguanas, lava lizards, geckos, snakes and the giant tortoises. The Galápagos and the Seychelles are the only two island groups in the world which are inhabited by giant tortoises. Of the 27 species of reptiles on the islands, 17 are endemic. Half of the resident population of birds is endemic to the Galápagos, but only 5 of the 19

species of sea birds found on the Galápagos are unique to the islands. These are: the Galápagos penguin, the flightless cormorant, the lava gull, the swallowtail gull and the waved albatross. There are 29 species of land birds on the islands, 22 of which are endemic. The number of native mammals is limited to two species of bats, a few species of rats and, of course, sea lions and seals. The Galápagos are washed by three currents which provide the islands with a rich and diverse underwater fauna. The number of species of fish has been estimated at 306, 17% of which are endemic. 16 species of whales and 7 species of dolphins are also in evidence around the islands.

**Galápagos Calendar**

**January**

The hot / rainy season becomes established. Air and water temperatures rise. 'Spring' arrives with the rain and green shoots appear even in arid areas. Land birds nest, land (Isabela) and marine (Espanola) iguana mating season starts. Green turtles start arriving to lay eggs.

**February**

Flamingos start nesting on Floreana, marine iguanas nest on Santa Cruz and Bahama pintail ducks start breeding. Sperm whales and occasionally blue whales may be seen off the west coasts of Isabella and Fernandina.

**March**

Hot and humid. Marine iguanas nest on Fernandina. Frigate bird mating season starts. Late in the month Waved Albatross arrive on Espanola.

**April**

Large numbers of Waved Albatross arrive on Espanola and start their noisy courtship ritual. Green turtle and land iguana eggs start to hatch. The last giant tortoises hatch.

**May**

Waved Albatross on Espanola start laying their eggs. Sea turtles hatching on Espanola, Floreana and Santiago, and marine iguanas hatching on Santa Cruz. Galápagos penguins active around Bartholome. The sea lion and fur seals mating season starts, running from May to December. As there is a 12 month gestation newborn pups also arrive during this period.

**June**

The garua season starts. The air and sea temperatures start to cool, south-east trade winds return and currents become a bit stronger. The nesting season of the giant tortoises starts. Humpback whales may be seen, as may migrant birds flying north.

**July**

Breeding season for blue footed boobies on Espanola as albatross fledglings start to be born. Flightless cormorants start courtship rituals on Fernandina. Whales and dolphins may be observed of the west coast of Isabela.

**August**

Oceans can be choppy. Migrant shore birds start to arrive. Mating season for Galápagos Hawks on Espanola and Santiago.

**September**

Air and sea temperatures at their lowest. Galápagos Penguins breeding especially around Bartholome although can occur all year. Manta Rays seen off east coast of Isabela. Height of the sea lion mating season, with rival males fighting for control of harems.

**October**

Weather can be mixed. Giant tortoises continue to lay eggs. Blue footed boobie chicks can be seen on Espanola and Isabela.

**November**

Water and air temperature begins to rise and the winds decrease. Can be some jellyfish. Good visibility for snorkelling – can be especially fun with sea lion pups.

**December**

Hot / rainy season begins. Air and sea temperatures continue to rise. The mist clears. Islands begin to green over as the rain falls. Green sea turtles start to mate. Giant tortoise eggs begin to hatch.

**December-May (hot/wet season)**

## Galápagos Cruises

A cruise around the Galápagos is the ideal way to experience the beauty and diversity of the islands and to admire the amazing land and marine life. Individual boat itineraries are fixed, however, the route may be changed due to weather conditions, unforeseen circumstances or conservation concerns.

### S/S Sagitta

7 nights - Wednesday to Wednesday; 16 passengers

Sagitta is a graceful and spacious sailing ship with 3 masts, 120ft in length and can accommodate 16 passengers comfortably.

There are 10 cabins located on 2 decks; each has a double lower berth and single upper berth, private facilities and air conditioning.

The upper deck is divided into two; the stern has a bar with shaded area for 'al fresco' dining and the bow, a spacious area, ideal for lounging, birding, watching for dolphins or star gazing.

Sagitta boasts a crew of 8 staff to provide a great service and experience for guests.

The Mary Anne is a romantic sailing ship which accommodates 24 guests in 12 double cabins, each with private facilities and air conditioning. All located on cabin deck.

There are 3 decks including cabin deck; Main deck, where public areas include a comfortable, wood panelled lounge with cosy bar area, dining room and library and Sun deck with an open air lounge/dining area and ample space with wet bar.

**Important**

Please note, when booking a Galápagos cruise a deposit for the cruise will be required in addition to our standard deposit. Upon entry to the Galápagos Islands, there is a National Park Fee of USD100 per person and Transit Fee USD10 per person; in most instances this can be pre-paid in Sterling at the time of booking. All trips including Galápagos include a one year membership to the Galápagos Conservation Trust (GCT). The funds raised by GCT are used to support the Galápagos in a variety of ways: please see pages 19 for further information on the valuable work taking place.



**M/C Nina**

7 nights; Saturday to Saturday; 18 passengers

Nina is one of the first newly designed series of luxury catamarans, known to be the fastest, sleekest, and most stable catamaran.

There are 8 double staterooms and 2 single staterooms, each with private balcony. All staterooms have private facilities, individual climate control and ample space for luggage. The staterooms are located on Main deck and Upper deck.

Guests have the choice of taking meals in the elegant indoor dining area on Main deck or outside on the Upper deck where there is a bar and plenty of space for BBQ.

There is also a comfortable lounge area and library complete with plasma TV, DVD player and stereo.

On Sun deck, there is a Jacuzzi and plenty of space to relax or look out for whales and dolphins.

**Galápagos Journey I (aka M/C Anahi)**

3 nights - Tuesday; 4 nights - Friday; 7 nights - Tuesday or Friday; 16 passengers

The Galápagos Journey I (formerly M/C Anahi) is a 90ft catamaran with 6 standard cabins on the main deck and 2 suites on the upper deck. The cabins offer private facilities, air conditioning and windows in all but one standard cabin which has a port hole.

The twin hull design of the catamaran allows for spacious accommodation, wide decks and great stability.

There is a comfortable indoor dining area and open plan lounge with library and TV/DVD available. On the upper deck there is a spacious bar area, sundeck and Jacuzzi. The open plan layout of the Galápagos Journey I is a great choice for those who would like a smaller vessel with a friendly and sociable atmosphere.

## Suggestions for choosing a cruise

- When choosing the duration, a 7 night cruise is the longest duration available and gives the ultimate amount of time, however, if time is limited, a 3 or 4 night cruise is certainly a reasonable amount of time to experience and enjoy the islands.
- When deciding on a boat, there is a choice of sailing/motor yacht, catamaran or motor yacht. It is recommended to consider the maximum number of guests on the vessel.
- All naturalist guides on board are trained by the Galápagos National Park Authority. Group guided tours on the islands are a maximum of one guide to sixteen guests.



### M/Y Eric, Flamingo and Letty

7 nights - Sunday, 20 passengers

The Eric, Flamingo & Letty are three 83ft identical motor yachts. Each yacht has ten cabins located on three decks: Lower Iguana deck, cabins are twin/triple with porthole; middle Booby deck, cabins are double with picture window and top, Dolphin deck, cabins are twin/double with picture window. All have private facilities and air conditioning.

Booby deck houses the dining room, bar, lounge with TV and library and Dolphin deck offers an observation area and sun deck.

The three boats will sail together on parts of the itinerary and for excursions, there is one naturalist guide for every 10 guests. Complimentary snorkelling equipment and wetsuits are included.

Odyssey I is a luxury yacht built for small groups providing a comfortable and relaxing environment on board.

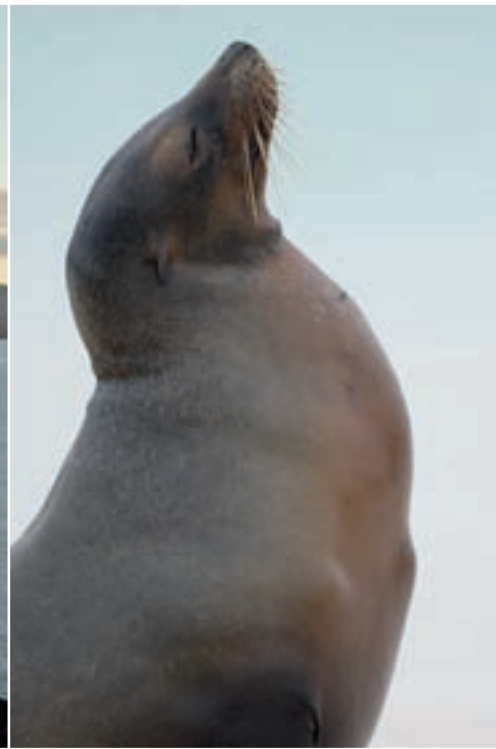
There are 4 decks in total; Lower deck offers 2 cabins suitable for single travellers. Main deck offers 2 twin cabins and 2 double cabins, a library, spacious lounge and chic dining area with bar. On Upper deck, there are 4 twin cabins, an outdoor bar and shaded terrace area and on Sun deck, there is a Jacuzzi and sun loungers.

Cabins include private bathroom and hairdryer, inter-cabin telephone, individually controlled air conditioning and 3 panoramic windows. Cabins measure an average of 21 square meters.

**Yacht Isabela II**

7 nights - Tuesday, 40 passengers

Yacht Isabela II is a deluxe expedition yacht, beautifully furnished and accommodating 40 guests. There are 3 decks; Main Deck, Cabin Deck and Sun Deck. Located on Main Deck, there is the restaurant, bar/lounge, reception, library and gift shop and Master Suite cabin.

On Cabin Deck, there are 20 standard cabins; 16 cabins with twin beds, 2 cabins with double bed and 2 cabins with double and single suitable for 2 adults and 1 child. Sun Deck is an observation deck with bar, seating area and Jacuzzi.

### Yacht La Pinta

7 nights - Friday, 48 passengers

Yacht La Pinta offers 24 spacious staterooms with ocean view accommodating 48 guests in total. All staterooms are located mid-ship on Upper Deck each with 2 double beds which can convert to 1 Queen bed, private facilities and individually controlled air conditioning. For families, 6 cabins are interconnecting and 4 cabins are suitable for triple occupancy. Attention to detail is important on La Pinta, for instance, bedding is fine cotton, down duvets with a choice of pillows.

There are spacious public areas on Boat Deck which include a large observation lounge and bar, a well stocked Natural History library, a small gym and Jacuzzi. On Main Deck, there is the dining room, reception area and boutique shop. Yacht La Pinta has successfully combined a luxury cruise with a relaxed atmosphere.

### M/V Santa Cruz

3 nights - Friday, 4 nights - Monday, 7 nights - Friday or Monday, 90 passengers

The Santa Cruz is a 237ft passenger ship with 44 cabins located on Boat deck, Upper deck and Main deck. On Boat deck, there are 2 master suites with double bed and private balcony and 2 junior suites with twin beds. On Upper and Main decks are a mix of 6 superior cabins with twin or double beds and 34 standard cabins; these are mostly twin bedded. Families can be easily accommodated in single, twin/double or triple. All cabins have private facilities and air conditioning.

The fourth deck is Sun deck and features a bar, Jacuzzi, observation platform for whale watching. In addition, the dining room, lounge/bar and library/reading room can be found on Sun deck. All areas of the ship are air conditioned. The Santa Cruz was exclusively built for sailing the Galápagos Islands.

## Galápagos Hotels – Santa Cruz Island

There is an alternative to taking a cruise of the Galápagos Islands for those who prefer to stay on land. Santa Cruz is home to the Charles Darwin Research Station and the Highlands, where it is possible to walk amongst the colony of the famous Galápagos Giant Tortoises. It is possible to stay on the coast near Puerto Ayora or in the Highlands overlooking the ocean and neighbouring islands.



### The Finch Bay Hotel

Puerto Ayora, Santa Cruz Island **FB** 3 night stays from a Sunday; 4 night stays from a Wednesday

The Finch Bay is located at Punta Estrada; a 5 minute water taxi ride from the port and town of Puerto Ayora. The hotel enjoys a quiet location, surrounded by mangroves and just a few metres from a sandy beach.

A modern, ecologically orientated hotel, there are 21, king size or twin bedded premium rooms, each with private facilities, air conditioning, safety box and hair dryer. New in 2010, there are 6 ocean view suites.

The restaurant offers International cuisine with buffet breakfast, a la carte lunch and dinner. Guests can relax in the bar/lounge area or enjoy the outdoor pool/Jacuzzi.

Sea kayaking, snorkelling and mountain biking (non-guided) are included within a 3 or 4 night package. Horseriding and an

introduction to Scuba diving can be arranged, payable locally.

Guided visits to the Charles Darwin Research Station and the highlands of Santa Cruz and a yacht excursion to nearby islands of Santa Fe, South Plaza, North Seymour or Bartholome are also included in the package.



### Galápagos Safari Camp

Highlands, Santa Cruz **HB**

The Galápagos Safari Camp is located in the highlands of Santa Cruz Island and offers breathtaking views over the Pacific Ocean and the western and northern islands of the Galápagos archipelago. The 'camp' is situated at an altitude of 480m above sea level and offers a unique micro climate where temperatures are slightly lower than the lowlands and the garua season is more benign.

There are 9 luxury 'tents' within the grounds, each one located approximately 70m from the main lodge. The tents have an elevated wooden floor which extends in front of the room to form the balcony (10m<sup>2</sup>) fitted with hammock and table with safari chairs. The spacious interior (27m<sup>2</sup>) offers a twin or double bed, en suite bathroom with hot shower and flush toilet and is elegantly furnished throughout.

The main lodge is perched on a hill with wonderful panoramic views. Breakfast, lunch and dinner are served here and can be taken seated around the 5m table for 18 or smaller tables on the veranda. Guests can also enjoy relaxing in the infinity pool.





## Isabela Island

The island of Isabela is the largest and one of the youngest of the Galápagos Islands and can be reached from Santa Cruz by flight or speedboat. Isabela is four times larger than Santa Cruz, and being less readily accessible, fewer visitors explore this well kept secret.



### Iguana Crossing

Puerto Vilamil 

The Iguana Crossing is a newly opened hotel in the Galápagos. The hotel has been created from native materials by local craftsman and owned by long time residents of Isabela Island. Located on the waterfront, the hotel is steps away from a stretch of pristine white sand beach protected by the National Park. Behind the hotel are wetlands where wildlife congregate and beyond views of the Sierra Negra Volcano.

Facilities include a swimming pool, roof top Jacuzzi, indoor and outdoor bar, restaurant, laundry service, 24 hour reception and WiFi internet access.

There are 12 rooms with either lagoon (wetlands) view or ocean view and a master suite.

All rooms are with private facilities, flat screen TV, Ipod dock, hairdryer, telephone and safe deposit box. Please note, the lagoon view are smaller than the ocean view rooms.

Marine Iguanas cross nearby from the wetlands to the sea hence the name of the hotel!



### Walking tour – Isabela Island

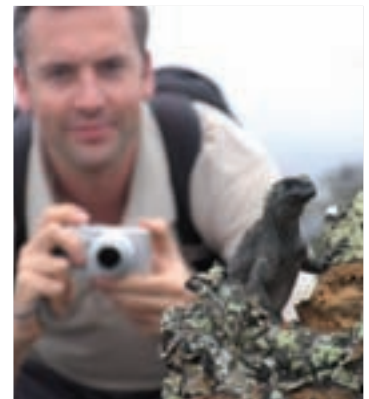
3, 4 or 5 NIGHTS

Based at a beachfront hotel in the charming fishing village of Puerto Villamil, there is a choice of 2, 3 or 4 night privately guided walking tours. Depending on the duration chosen, there will be opportunities to view the endangered giant tortoise; walk to the second largest volcano crater in the World; visit a white-tip shark canal and sea lion breeding area and snorkel with possible sightings of rays, marine turtles, marine iguana and penguins!

Breakfasts and lunches are included and dinners to be taken independently to enjoy dining at the hotel or at your choice of the local restaurants.

The walking tours make for an ideal combination with a Galápagos cruise and if taking a land based trip only and staying at a hotel in Santa Cruz, it is possible to take a

speedboat to Isabela – recommended for those travelling between December and May.
